Reading at home

Reading is fundamental to all children's progress and development at school. Being a fluent reader enables children to access all areas of the curriculum and work independently. It is fundamental to all the work that the team at St Erth do to help our pupils progress. Recently, Mrs Murgatroyd communicated with parents, highlighting how we work to ensure the teaching of reading and the pupils experience of it is as high a standard as possible, referring to our 7 areas of reading:

- We prioritise reading
- We work to create a love of reading
- We have a systematic phonics system that ensures children make progress rapidly
- Our phonics reading books match the sounds children have learnt
- We teaching phonics from the 1st day of reception
- We ensure pupils can catch up quickly
- We are experts in early reading

Reading at home regularly plays a crucial role in creating a love of reading, allowing children to progress through regular practice and helping pupils catch up. We understand that family life is busy and finding the time to fit things in is difficult, but making the time to hear your children read, share a book, or make them turn off screens and read independently has enormous benefits and helps to create habits that support children's progress academically beyond primary school. We are grateful to all parents who ensure they do this regularly. It can be as little as 2 pages, but regular engagement is key. We have rewards in school to recognise the children's efforts in doing this also. A key objective in Key stage 1 is fluency. It is important that children re-read books they are familiar with to achieve this. This means that children will be sent home with the same book on consecutive nights at times.

To further encourage the children, we are adding a further reward for Key Stage 1 children, Treen and Mousehole, who manage to read regularly at home. Children who have their book signed or written in after having read 4 times in a week will be added to our reading, 'Roll of Honour!' which will be on the newsletter each week. We look forward to seeing who makes it!

Don't forget all children have logins to Reading Eggs, which can be downloaded as an app. This will support their progress in phonics and their comprehension skills.

Current Coronavirus Guidance

Following the updates to government guidance through the living with Covid-19 plan announced on February 24th, Parents need to be aware of the following, this is also reflected in the school's risk assessment. Full details can be found at https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/covid-19-people-with-covid-19-and-their-contacts

- Anyone with a new or continuous cough, a high temperature, a loss of, or change to, your normal sense of taste and smell, should order a PCR test and are advised to stay at home whilst awaiting results.
- Other symptoms linked to Covid -19 include: shortness of breath, fatigue, loss of appetite, muscle
 ache, sore throat, headache, stuffy or runny nose, diarrhoea, nausea and vomiting. Any of these symptoms may have anther cause.
- Anyone with a positive LFD test is also advised to stay at home and order a PCR test, even if not displaying symptoms.
- The most effective way of avoiding passing on Covid-19 infection remains to stay at home and avoid contact with other people. If you have Covid-19 you should stay at home.
